



Down Memory Lane.....'A' Flt CPOs doing their bit for US-Anglo relations.



Thanks to Richard Fagg who recently found some old photos of his time on A Flt 1987-1990 and explains how he and Dave Sutton (with beard) ended up in a High School Yearbook during a port visit to Florida in 1988!

The visit came about when I looked at the ship's notice board and an American family were looking to host a couple of guys from the ship for Thanksgiving dinner at their home in Deerfield Beach FL. I made contact with them and Dave and I were picked up from the ship. We got on really well with our hosts Nick and Joan Ziegler; Nick was a local Attorney and Joan and some of the family were teachers at a local school, Coconut Creek High. They asked us to the school and we spent a day there helping with English lessons and also conducted a question and answer session with the students about the RN. We were presented with a Fraternity and even made it into the yearbook.





I maintained a friendship beyond that initial meeting and when the ship returned to Florida the following year I stayed with the family once again. In 1989 my wife Jo along with my two sons came out to Florida and I had booked accommodation in Orlando (pre internet), which turned out to be quite grim. Nick and Joan came to our rescue and we checked out, drove to Deerfield Beach and then onto the Florida Keys to stay in their holiday home before returning to their home in Deerfield and then back to Orlando to a much nicer hotel! I continued to write to Nick and Joan for many years but lost touch around the time I was teaching in a local College of Further Education.
