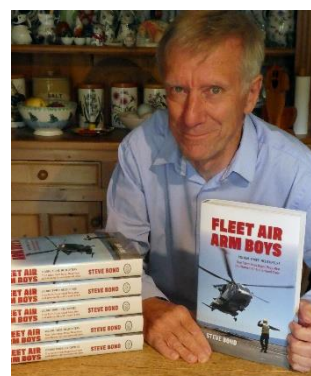

A chance meeting!

I hope no-one minds my monopolisation of the newsletter this month, but I recently had a completely by chance meeting with a lady who has an incredibly strong connection to 849 NAS and I thought I would share the story.

Although we focus on the AEW capability of 849 since 1952, it is important to remember that 849 and our sister squadrons 854 and 857 were WW2 squadrons and particularly key to the successes of the British Pacific Fleet in 1945.

A few weeks ago, I was lucky to attend the Queen's Jubilee Party at the Palace and as I was queuing to go through security (along with 1000s of others) I noticed on the arm of the lady stood beside me, the bottom of tattoo which showed a name and then what looked like a squadron crest.

The more I stared the more I was sure it was a naval air squadron crest and I asked her if she wouldn't mind showing me. I couldn't believe it when she

revealed the 849 crest. It turns out that the lady, Vicky, is the grand-daughter of PO Airman William James Smith McRae (known as Jimmy), a TAG on 849 NAS who was embarked in HMS Victorious. Sadly, Jimmy was one of nine aircrew captured as POWs during the raids on

Palembang in January 1945. The nine were held in captivity and were tragically executed after the surrender of Japan. Jimmy's wife campaigned for years for recognition of the 'Palembang Nine' and was instrumental in commissioning the memorials at Changi and Auckland. Vicky and her family have provided me with many personal photos of her grand-father and I will tell the story of Jimmy in our next newsletter.
